Black History Month Happenings in Kindergarten – Grade 5

African American History is required both in the Florida standards and by mandates of instruction in Florida Statute, s. 1003.42(2)(f), F.S.



Elementary Literacy celebrates the historical and literary contributions of the following figures, fostering an appreciation for their impact and achievements. Students will learn about Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.'s leadership in the Civil Rights Movement and his dream of equality, Rosa Parks' courageous stand against segregation, and Harriet Tubman's heroic efforts to lead enslaved people to freedom through the Underground Railroad. They will also explore Frederick Douglass' powerful writings and speeches advocating for abolition and equality, as well as Ruby Bridges' bravery in desegregating schools. Through these lessons, students will be inspired by the stories of resilience, leadership, and the enduring fight for justice.

K-5 Math honors the achievements of African American mathematicians whose contributions have left a lasting impact on their fields and beyond.

Highlighted figures include:

• Katherine Johnson (1918-2020): A brilliant African American mathematician whose groundbreaking work at NASA was critical to the success of early space missions.



- **Elbert Frank Cox (1895–1969):** The first African American to earn a Ph.D. in mathematics (Cornell University, 1925). He made significant contributions to polynomial theory.
- **Euphemia Lofton Haynes (1890–1980):** The first African American woman to earn a Ph.D. in mathematics (1943, Catholic University of America).
- Gladys West (born 1930): She is a pioneering African American mathematician whose work was crucial in the development of the Global Positioning System (GPS).

Students can discover how these trailblazers utilized their mathematical expertise to innovate, inspire, and address real-world challenges. Students will participate in discussions about their accomplishments and explore how their work connects to modern advancements in STEM.

K-5 Science is highlighting influential African Americans who have made the world a better place through their scientific discoveries or innovations. Highlights will be provided to teachers weekly to share with their students through the Science Spotlight.





Throughout the year, **K-5 Social Studies** instructional guides include lessons that engage students in exploring the lives and contributions of African Americans to local, state, and national history and society.

In February, students will learn about Carter G. Woodson (the 'Father of Black History Month'), James Weldon Johnson, the Tuskegee Airmen, Mary McLeod Bethune, Rev. Leon Lowry, Zora Neale Hurston, Thurgood Marshall, and other notable African American History Makers.

Black History Month essay contest: The Florida Department of Education and Volunteer Florida encourage students to participate in the Black History Month <u>essay contest</u> with the 2025 theme "Honoring African American Contributions to Florida's Success." Entry deadline is February 3, 2025.

Black History Month Happenings in Grade 6 - 8

English Language Arts (ELA):

Middle School ELA celebrates the historical and literary contributions of the following individuals and authors during Black History Month:

<u>Life Doesn't Frighten Me</u> by Maya Angelou, 1993; <u>Yet Do I Marvel</u> by Countee Cullen, 1925; <u>I, Too</u> by Langston Hughes, 1925; <u>Rosa Parks, My Story</u> by Rosa Parks, 1992; <u>No Dream Too High</u> by Simone Biles, 2013; <u>Narrative of the Life of Frederick</u> <u>Douglass, an American Slave</u> by Frederick Douglass, 1845; *Speech to the Ohio Women's Conference Aint I A Woman*, by Sojourner Truth, 1851; <u>We Real Cool</u>, by Gwendolyn Brooks, 1959.

Math:

6-8 Math is providing realigned lessons for teachers to infuse Black History into their math curriculum. These will be available in the 6-8 Math SharePoint and on Canvas. Additional focus is on *Celebrating Black Mathematicians*, including Gladys Smith, who helped to create GPS technology.

Science: A s promoted by the National Science Teachers Association (NSTA), science teachers guide students to research and recognize the many scientific contributions of African Americans during Black History Month and all year long. These include Garrett Morgan, an African American inventor, businessman, and community leader. His most notable inventions were a three-light traffic light and a smoke hood (a predecessor to the gas mask) notably used in a 1916 tunnel construction disaster rescue. Resources for this are available via 6-8 Science Teams and featured at the January 2025 Subject Area Leader Training.

Social Studies: Much of the curriculum of middle school US History courses during February covers established state benchmarks on African American history, with lessons and resources to accomplish this available via 6-8 Social Studies Teams. The district Black History theme this month is *A Salute to Labor Pioneers,* so teachers can also spotlight two pioneers with a Florida connection: Mary McLeod Bethune and A. Philip Randolph.

Black History Month essay contest: The Florida Department of Education and Volunteer Florida encourage students to participate in the Black History Month essay contest with the 2025 theme "*Honoring African American Contributions to Florida's Success.*" Each winner receives a 2-year Florida College Plan scholarship from the Florida Prepaid College Foundation and a \$100 gift card for school supplies. Entry due by February 3.

National History Day: 6-8 Social Studies sponsors the regional competition of the National History Day competition which offers the opportunity to research and showcase Black History and the contributions of African Americans. National History Day's 2025 theme is *Rights & Responsibilities in History*.

Social Studies

World History: Explore global labor movements during the Industrial Revolution. Examine reforms like Britain's Factory Acts and their global influence (SS.912.W.6.1, SS.912.W.6.3).

- Discussion Question: How did labor movements during the Industrial Revolution influence workers' rights globally?

U.S. History: Study African American labor pioneers such as A. Philip Randolph and key events like the Pullman Strike and the Fair Labor Standards Act (SS.912.A.5.10, SS.912.A.7.6).

- Discussion Question: How did African American labor leaders shape the Civil Rights Movement through their advocacy?

US Government: Analyze the role of government in labor policies and landmark cases like NLRB v. Jones & Laughlin Steel Corporation (SS.912.CG.3.8).

- Discussion Question: What role should the government play in protecting workers' rights while balancing economic growth?

Economics: Investigate labor unions' impact on wages and economic policies, including modern challenges in the gig economy (SS.912.E.2.2).

- Discussion Question: How have labor unions influenced income equality in the U.S. over time?

Students will have an opportunity to build their literacy skills through multiple texts explored throughout the month. Below are three highlights to support family discussions:

Rashema Melson's Valedictorian Address

Graduating as valedictorian from Anacostia High School in Washington, D.C., while living in a homeless shelter, Rashema Melson defied the odds to inspire many. Despite her challenging circumstances, she prioritized her education, attending classes, studying, and participating in sports for over twelve hours each day before returning to the shelter. In her 2014 speech, Melson shares life lessons and the people who shaped her journey to success. Zora Neale Hurston's Their Eves Were Watching God: First published in 1937, this novel cemented Zora Neale Hurston's place as an

influential American writer. It tells the story of Janie Crawford, a spirited, independent woman who

pursues love despite facing prejudice and poverty. In an excerpt, Eatonville locals speculate about Janie's mysterious past as she returns home.

Leon Bridges: Overcoming Isolation to Find His Voice Leon Bridges, a former dishwasher from Fort Worth, Texas, became a critically acclaimed soul singer at 25. In this article for Billboard, Jeff Weiss chronicles Bridges' journey, highlighting how he overcame childhood isolation and developed his unique sound, proving that you can't teach soul.

Science

Black History Month shines a spotlight on the invaluable contributions of African Americans across all fields, including science, where their achievements have shaped our world.

Dr. George Washington

Carver (1864–1943), a pioneering agricultural scientist, promoted sustainable farming through crop rotation and invented over 300 products from peanuts and sweet potatoes, transforming agriculture and empowering Southern farmers.

Dr. Mae Jemison (1956present), an astronaut, engineer, and physician, broke barriers as the first African American woman in space aboard the Space Shuttle Endeavour in 1992. Her work continues to inspire diversity in STEM fields.

Dr. Charles Drew (1904-1950), a trailblazing surgeon and medical researcher, revolutionized blood storage methods, saving countless lives during World War II and creating the blueprint for modern blood banks.

Their legacies exemplify the profound impact of African Americans on science and society. Students are encouraged to reflect upon their own contributions to their communities and to society as a whole.

Instructional Planning Resources

The materials in this section are intended to assist teachers in recognizing and teaching about the contributions of African Americans and celebrating their significant achievements as set forth in Statute and standards by the state of Florida:

Required Public School Instruction on the History of African Americans Florida Statute 1003.42

(2) Members of the instructional staff of the public schools, subject to the rules and regulations of the commissioner, the state board, and the school board, shall teach efficiently and faithfully, using the books and materials required, following the prescribed courses of study, and employing approved methods of instruction, the following:

(h)The history of African Americans, including the history of African peoples before the political conflicts that led to the development of slavery, the passage to America, the enslavement experience, abolition, and the contributions of African Americans to society.

Instructional materials shall include the contributions of African Americans to American society.

Black History Month: History and Overview

<u>History and Overview - Black History Month: A Commemorative Observances Legal Research</u> <u>Guide - Research Guides at Library of Congress (loc.gov)</u>

National Black History Month has its origins in 1915, when historian and author Dr. Carter G. Woodson founded the Association for the Study of Negro Life and History. This organization is now known as the Association for the Study of African American Life and History External (ASALH). Through this organization, Dr. Woodson initiated the first Negro History Week in February 1926. Dr. Woodson selected the week in February that included the birthdays of Abraham Lincoln and Frederick Douglass, two key figures in the history of Black Americans.

In 1975, President Ford issued a Message on the Observance of Black History Week External urging all Americans to "recognize the important contribution made to our nation's life and culture by black citizens." In 1976, ASALH expanded this commemoration of Black history in the United States from a week-long observance to Black History Month, which also has been known as African American History Month. In the same year, President Ford issued a Message on the Observance of Black History Month External. In subsequent years, presidents continued to issue messages External honoring Black History Month.

In 1986, Congress passed Public Law 99-244, which designated February 1986 as "National Black (Afro-American) History Month." This law noted that February 1, 1986, would "mark the beginning of the sixtieth annual public and private salute to Black History." The law further directed the president to issue a proclamation calling on the people of the United States to observe February 1986 as Black History Month with the appropriate ceremonies and activities. President Reagan issued Presidential Proclamation 5443 External, which proclaimed that "the foremost purpose of Black History Month is to make all Americans aware of this struggle for freedom and equal opportunity." This proclamation stated further that this month was a time "to celebrate the many achievements of African Americans in every field from science and the arts to politics and religion."

Since 1996, presidents have issued annual proclamations for National Black History Month. In January 1996, President Clinton issued Presidential Proclamation 6863 External for "National African American History Month." The proclamation emphasized the theme for that year, the achievements of Black women from Sojourner Truth to Mary McLeod Bethune and Toni Morrison. Since 1996, Congress has regularly passed resolutions honoring Black History Month. In February 1996, the Senate passed Senate Resolution 229 commemorating Black History Month and the contributions of Black American U.S. Senators.

Suggestions for Teaching Black History

- Incorporate Black history year-round, not just in February. Use the month of February to dig deeper into history and make connections with the past.
- Continue Learning. Explore how to provide an in-depth and thorough understanding of Black history. A textbook is just one of many resources. While exploring multiple resources in this document, allow for opportunities to learn along with your students.
- Make Black history relevant to *all* students. Provide opportunities for student discussion and reflection for connected learning to occur.
- Relate lessons to other parts of your curriculum so that focusing on a leader, like Thurgood Marshall, expands upon rather than diverts from your curriculum. By the time February comes around, the context of the struggle for civil rights and social justice should be familiar to students because those issues have already been addressed across the curriculum and in previous learning.
- Connect issues in the past to current issues to make history relevant to students' lives. For example, ask students to gather information with a focus on how a particular leader has worked to change society.
- Keep in mind that Black History Month also honors the history before the United States was created, which could include ancient African kingdoms, diaspora, etc.
- During Black History Month, it is best to connect and integrate the learning across the curriculum to prevent trivializing and marginalizing the experiences and contributions of history makers.
- Avoid a focus on superficial cultural traits based on stereotypes. For example, it's ok to celebrate black music, but teachers should also explore the political and social contexts that give rise to musical forms like hip hop, blues and jazz.
- Historical events and people's lived experiences are situated in a particular context, time and place. Teaching about Black history must include also teaching about the context in developmentally appropriate ways.
- As per the Florida Department of Education Code of Ethics, take precautions to avoid presenting personal views and value judgements.
