This project has been made possible through a collaboration with Little Red Wagon Native Nursery. Based in Hillsborough County, the nursery focuses on growing and selling native plants and their support has been key to bringing the idea to life. Staff and students would like to extend a big thank you to the nursery for helping make this happen. Teacher Brooke Anderson, a sponsor for Riverview High School's Environmental Club, was the one to credit for this idea. Anderson said, "the decision to make a Butterfly Garden has been in the works since the middle of this year." The benefits of a butterfly garden are clear. However, Ms. Anderson highlights its deeper impact: "it's going to help the local environment by attracting pollinators like butterflies and bees, and it will also just help to make our space more pretty, liven it all up a bit," said Anderson. 



Last mindset


