

School Sanctioned Events

As of this year, students have been informed of certain criteria pertaining to their ability to attend School Sanctioned events such as Homecoming, Prom, and Grad Bash. This criterion includes: No ISS for Levels 1-3, no days of OSS, and no more than 5 absences. Principal Brian Spiro said, "this year we focused on communicating it ahead of time. The whole idea is really more about reporting the students who are doing what they're supposed to be doing every day, having a firm stand on telling students that they should be coming every day." The specific criterion follows Riverview's pre-existing policies, A student at Riverview experienced the repercussions of not following these measures and therefore lost their ability to attend Grad Bash and Prom, Juan Hernandez grade 12 is a senior at Riverview who has been excluded from attending Prom and was unable to attend Grad Bash for seniors. Hernandez said, "I was aware of my absences, but I forgot the number of absences that gets you exempt from attending the school events." Hernandez was made aware of his absences and their consequences via email, "I understand the rules implemented but I find it irritating that kids who did purchase the tickets won't get a refund even if they purchased it before they got the email telling them they wouldn't be able to go," said Hernandez 12.


